Android provides a relatively simple (and very well supported) platform for coding a user interface and means that the finished application will work on any Android device (smartphone, tablet, etc.) The book is supported by a webpage which contains the source code

for the Android app and other helpful material. The Android app that is detailed in the book is also available for download from the Google Play store.
